With little formal education, virtually no job experience, still working their own agricultural lands, and many as single mothers, the co-op workers have maintained their business for over twenty-five years. Equal Shares is written in different voices, and tells the story of the defining moments in the lives of the Oodi Weavers. As the workers weave their village stories into the tapestries, the book weaves a story that depicts their evolving collective experience. It's a model of community action. In this book Vivian Paley employs a unique strategy to probe the moral dimensions of the classroom. Paley introduces a new rule—"You can't say you can't play"—to her kindergarten classroom and solicits the opinions of older children regarding the fairness of such a rule.
